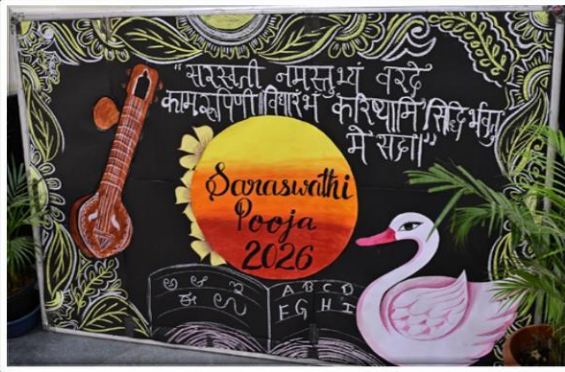

“CHEMISTRY FORUM PRACTICAL MEETING”



The Department of Chemistry convened a pivotal forum meeting on January 22, 2026, at the BEL Chemistry Department to streamline academic protocols and examination strategies for the upcoming boards. Attended by the entire chemistry faculty, the session was dedicated to ensuring a standardized, student-centric approach to both practical and theory assessments.

A primary focus of the proceedings was the organization of laboratory examinations. The forum established a structured format where 12 students will perform 12 distinct experiments simultaneously, under the close monitoring and evaluation of the concerned faculty members. To maintain administrative discipline, a strict policy was enacted regarding student batches: once assigned, no batch changes will be permitted under any circumstances, ensuring the integrity of the examination schedule.

Beyond technical logistics, the meeting emphasized a supportive evaluation environment. Faculty members were collectively advised to adopt a balanced perspective toward grading and student interaction. The resolution called for a compassionate approach, urging examiners not to be overly rigid regarding marks or conduct, and ensuring that attendance marks are allocated to almost all students to recognize their consistent effort throughout the academic year.

For theory preparation, the department reached a consensus to prioritize the official Board-released model question papers. This alignment ensures that students are acclimated to the expected exam patterns and difficulty levels. Additionally, for faculty assigned to external duties, a strict punctuality protocol was reinforced, requiring all examiners to report to their assigned centers at least 30 minutes prior to the commencement of exams. This meeting underscores the department's commitment to excellence, punctuality, and the holistic success of the student body.

“PHYSICS FORUM PRACTICAL MEETING ”



On Jan 23rd, the Department of Physics conducted a comprehensive forum meeting to finalize the academic and administrative roadmap for the upcoming board examinations. The discussion focused on ensuring a smooth, disciplined, and student-friendly examination process. A major part of the meeting addressed the organization of laboratory examinations. It was decided that 12 students would perform 12 different experiments simultaneously during the practical sessions. The department also implemented a strict “no-change” policy regarding batch allocation; students who miss their assigned batch will not be permitted to shift to another batch under any circumstances. Faculty conduct during examinations was also discussed. Examiners were advised to maintain professionalism and avoid standing near any particular student for extended periods to prevent unnecessary pressure. At the same time, faculty members were encouraged to maintain a supportive and polite attitude toward students and not be excessively rigid while awarding marks. The department further agreed that attendance marks should be granted to most students in recognition of their consistent participation throughout the year. The meeting also emphasized technical preparedness and documentation procedures. Spare equipment must be kept ready during practical examinations to avoid disruptions. All official records must contain six verified signatures and be properly sealed. For theory preparation, faculty members decided to focus primarily on the board-released model question papers to align student preparation with the expected examination pattern. Faculty assigned to external centres must report at least 30 minutes before the examination begins, and any delay by external examiners must be officially reported to the Board. The meeting concluded with a commitment to award marks fairly based on student performance.
